Attached please find two letters recently sent to Todd Rathner of the Arizona Shooting Range Coalition and Chris Cox of the National Rifle Association regarding the Houghton Road shooting facility and the Desert Trails Gun Club and Training Facility. As you can see, I have recommended that the Houghton facility be fully funded in the proposed May 2004 bond election, and have requested an appraisal of the Desert Trails facility. Ideally, the appraisal will be acceptable and an appropriate acquisition agreement can be reached with the owner and the facilities can be operated as a single unit, providing a full range of recreational shooting opportunities and training.

Dear Mr. Rathner:

We appreciate your letter regarding this matter. It is our hope that Pima County will be in a position to purchase the facility and ask that a non-profit entity operate the facility on our behalf.

We believe that acquisition of this facility and expansion of the Houghton Road facility are absolutely necessary to meet the needs of shooting and hunting enthusiasts in Pima County. We have asked for a County-authorized appraisal of the facility and will be receiving the results of the appraisal in the near future. Once received we will ask the Board of Supervisors to consider acquisition, either directly or conditionally, based on approval of the bond issue, which we believe is essential to complement the Houghton Road facility.

We will also ask that your Coalition and affiliate organizations consider supporting the Sonoran Desert Conservation Plan. As you know from our presentation to the Arizona Game and Fish Commission, the Conservation Plan has nothing to do with and will not regulate game or wildlife in Arizona or Pima County. It is intended for the purpose of containing urban sprawl, which we believe is the greatest threat to continued hunting within Pima County.

We are going to place a resolution before the Board of Supervisors for their consideration. We hope your member organizations can support whatever actions the Board takes regarding an open space component of a May 18, 2004 bond issue as the County has never regulated, nor do we intend to regulate, hunting on County property, even if acquired for open space



Mr. Huckleberry:

**The mission of the Arizona Shooting Range Coalition is to prevent the closure of shooting ranges in Arizona, and to encourage their development statewide.**

The Desert Trails Gun Club and Training Facilities, a private facility located at 7777 East Valencia Road, is facing imminent closure due to the personal circumstances of the owner. He has been forced to place the range up for sale. For it to survive it must be purchased with the intent of utilizing it as a shooting range. It would be a great loss to the community to have it bulldozed to clear the way for some other type of business.

This facility is open to the public and provides a safe, modern shooting site for the holders of more than 600 individual and family memberships, **plus thousands more who shoot on a daily fee basis.** In addition to recreational shooting, the Desert Trails range is a principal firearms training facility for U.S. Customs, Veterans Administration Hospital Police, Pima County Adult Probation, Air Force R.O.T.C. and others. The range and the modern air-conditioned classrooms are used for Arizona Certified CCW training and the Arizona Game and Fish Department's Hunter Education classes, as well as numerous youth education classes in gun safety.

Closure of the facility at this time would be detrimental to these programs, and would negatively impact thousands of Pima County's hunters and recreational shooters. Tucson is already experiencing a shortage of outdoor shooting ranges. With hunting season approaching and Pima County's 21,000 licensed hunters needing a place to sight in rifles, closure of the Desert Trails facility will send many of them into the desert.


You are well aware of the situation regarding the Tucson Rod & Gun Club's Sabino Canyon Range. The effort to reopen that range could take significantly more time. The planned (and absolutely essential) Houghton Road range is not scheduled to be operational for up to a year, and it will likely be several years before all of the Houghton Road amenities are in place. While the Desert Trails Range will not fulfill all the needs of Pima County's shooters, it can continue meeting at least some of those needs while at the same time assuring that Pima County will have a great urban firearms training facility well into the future.

The Arizona Shooting Range Coalition requests that Pima County arrange to purchase the facility with County funds and work with the Coalition to keep it in operation. The Coalition will enthusiastically assist the County in arranging to contract out the management of the facility. If managed properly, under contract to a private organization, this range will be self-supporting thus requiring little or no operational expense from the county.

Alternative uses of this property are extremely limited due to its close proximity to the Davis Monthan airfield. It is, therefore, unlikely that removal of the property from the tax base would have any negative revenue impact on the county.

The **Arizona Shooting Range Coalition** looks forward to working with you on this issue to find the best solution for Pima County and the thousands of shooters who reside here.

I write in support of the Arizona Shooting Range Coalition and its goal to preserve and expand shooting range facilities in Arizona.


It has come to our attention that a private shooting range facility is facing closure. The Desert Trails Gun Club and Training Facilities serves as a safe and accessible shooting site for thousands of Pima County residents, including more than 600 individual and family memberships. This facility has served both the State and the County by acting as a training site for groups such as the Pima County Adult Probation, U.S. Customs, Veterans Administration Hospital police, and others. The classrooms have been used to carry out Arizona Certified CCW training and the Arizona Game and Fish Department's Hunter Education classes.

The County has an opportunity to prevent the closure of this facility and help continue the service that Desert Trails Gun Club has been providing to the thousands of shooting enthusiasts that reside within Pima County. Due to urban sprawl and development the more than 20,000 licensed hunters across the County are finding it increasingly difficult to access safe and affordable shooting facilities. If Desert Trails Gun Club and Training Facilities is not purchased by a buyer with the intent to continue the operation of the shooting range facility, the residents of Pima County will lose a valuable resource that thousands have come to rely on to fulfill their shooting needs.

On behalf of the National Rifle Association and tens of thousands of NRA members living in Arizona, I respectfully request that Pima County consider the purchase of Desert Trails Guns Club and Shooting Facilities with the purpose of keeping it open. Through private contracting the maintenance of this facility would be of little or no cost to the County and could continue to preserve the rich hunting and shooting heritage that Arizonans have grown to love.

It is my hope that the officials of Pima County will do their part to help serve their residents with well managed facilities to accommodate the thousands of residents that enjoy shooting and hunting on a regular basis. Tucson Rod and Gun Club, a 3,500 family organization, would like to go on record as supporting the Arizona Shooting Range Coalition's position that Pima County should purchase the Desert Trails Shooting Range, and the addition of \$2.5 million to build the Houghton Rd. Shooting Range.

It is apparent that Tucson has a pressing need for safe shooting opportunities. Given our population we can estimate the over a hundred thousand Tucsonans own firearms. The number of deer hunters alone is estimated at over 20,000. In addition to these are law enforcement agents, CCW carry instructors, hunter education instructors, and others who have specialized range needs. A need of this magnitude cannot be met by any one range.

TR&GC's range, located just off Sunrise and Sabino Canyon, historically served the northern part of Tucson. Desert Trails on Valencia has served the southern portion, as will the proposed range on Houghton. Given the number of Tucson's sport shooters, all these ranges together will barely meet the City's needs. Three locations with 50-70 rifle lanes between them will leave little enough surplus to handle 20,000 deer hunters sighting in.

At present, those needs are approaching emergency levels. As you know, TR&GC's range use has been suspended. The proposed county range has yet to be built. We are now informed that Desert Trails may have to cease operation. If this occurs, safe shooting opportunities will completely vanish for Tucsonans. The only remaining rifle ranges would be one far up Oracle, northwest of us, and

another even farther on the road to Ajo. Hunter safety instruction anywhere near Tucson's center would become extinct, and 20,000 hunters would be forced (as I have been forced in the past) to look for open desert to sight in.
