

Purpose

The purpose of the election is to submit to the qualified electors of Pima County six separate questions as to whether bonds of the County should be authorized to be issued in addition to all bonds authorized at previous elections.

Overview of Questions

1. Sonoran Desert Open Space and Habitat Protection; Preventing Urban Encroachment of Davis-Monthan Air Force Base **\$174,300,000**

For the purpose of acquiring real and personal property for open space and habitat protection, and to prevent urban encroachment of Davis-Monthan Air Force Base?

2. Public Health and Community Facilities **\$81,800,000**

For the purpose of acquiring, developing, expanding, improving and equipping new and existing facilities to further the health, education, welfare and safety of the citizens of the County, including County hospitals, clinics and other buildings, museums and facilities for the arts; facilities for the disposal of solid waste; and lighting, housing and other improvements and facilities to further neighborhood reinvestment?

3. Public Safety and Justice Facilities **\$183,500,000**

For the purpose of acquiring, developing, improving and equipping public safety and justice facilities in Pima County, including a new court complex, renovation of the County's Old Courthouse, jail security improvements, and a regional emergency radio communications system?

4. Parks and Recreation Facilities **\$96,450,000**

For the purpose of acquiring, developing, expanding, improving and equipping new and existing parks and recreational facilities in Pima County, including athletic fields, community centers, libraries, historic and cultural facilities and trails?

5. River Parks and Flood Control Improvements **\$46,200,000**

For the purpose of acquiring, constructing, expanding and improving the flood control facilities in Pima County, including bank stabilization, channels, drainage ways, dikes, levees, and other flood control improvements, river parks and related facilities?

6. Sewer System Revenue Bonds **\$150,000,000**

For the purpose of paying the costs of improvements, expansions and extensions to the sewer plant and system of Pima County?

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Question No. 4

Parks, Recreation and Library Projects

PARKS AND RECREATION

Pima County Parks \$26,900,000

- 1 Flowing Wells Community Center** \$3,500,000
For the development of an 18,000 square foot community center with office space, multi-purpose room, game room, teen, youth, and senior rooms, exercise room, craft room, social services offices, and landscaping, to be located near Wetmore and Flowing Wells Road.
- 2 Southeast Regional Park/Shooting Range** \$3,500,000
For development of Phase II of the shooting range, which includes an archery range, additional gun shooting range, shotgun range, instruction range and support facilities, to be located in the fast growing Rita Ranch area of Tucson.
- 3 Lighting of Existing Sports Fields** \$3,000,000
For the replacement of ball field light fixtures at McDonald District Park, Littletown Park, Bud Walker Park, and Ted Walker Sportspark, and the installation of ball field lights on specific fields at Flowing Wells Park, McDonald District Park, and Northwest/YMCA fields.
- 4 Curtis Park - Flowing Wells East** \$2,250,000
For the development of 2 lighted little league fields, 1 lighted senior league field, restroom, walkways, riparian restoration, off-leash dog facility, free-play turf area, ramadas, picnic facilities, playground, landscaping, parking, field and security lighting and connections to the Rillito River Park, to be located at the northwest corner of Curtis Road and La Cholla Blvd. just south of and adjacent to the Rillito River Park.
- 5 Catalina Community Park** \$2,000,000
For the development of a community center, library, baseball and soccer field complex, playground, basketball court, volleyball, field lighting, parking, picnic facilities, ramadas, restroom and landscaping, to be located in the village of Catalina, north of Tucson.
- 6 Dan Felix Memorial Park – Pegler Wash** \$1,750,000
For the development of 1 soccer field, security lighting, playground, free-play turf area, restroom, walking/jogging path, ramadas, picnic facilities, parking, two basketball courts, landscaping, connections to the Rillito River

Park, water fountains, and lights for 3 soccer fields to be located just north of the Rillito River and south of Orange Grove Road.

- 7 Brandi Fenton Memorial Park** \$3,000,000
For the development of an equestrian staging area, equestrian arena, restoration of existing historic buildings and landscape, outdoor classrooms, open pastures/playfields, ramadas, restrooms, maintenance compound/building, landscaping, parking and multi-use buildings, to be located at East River Road just west of the Jewish Community Center.
 - 8 Mehl-Foothills Park** \$2,000,000
For the development of a new soccer field, softball field, parking, infrastructure improvements, entry road, drainage improvements, sports field lighting, security lighting, playgrounds, maintenance compound, connective facilities to the Rillito River Park including a memorial plaza, to be located at River Road 1 mile east of Swan Road.
 - 9 Rillito Race Track** \$2,250,000
For the relocation of 2 stables, construction of 2 soccer fields, security lighting, entry and parking lot, ramadas, picnic facilities, lighting for 4 soccer fields, maintenance compound, landscaping, expanded and improved parking and trail connections to the Rillito River Park.
 - 10 Kino Public Sports Field Lighting** \$650,000
For the lighting of the existing baseball sports fields #5 and #3, to increase availability for public use.
 - 11 Feliz Paseos Universal Access Park** \$1,000,000
For the development of handicap accessible trails within a natural environmental setting, adjacent to Tucson Mountain Natural Resource Park, for the unique purpose of being able to enjoy and experience natural mountain park settings.
 - 12 Picture Rocks Pool** \$2,000,000
For the development of a 25-yard pool, zero depth area, 360° slide, guard house, maintenance and storage building, ramadas, and support facilities, to be located just west of the Tucson Mountains in Avra Valley.
- City of Tucson Parks** \$29,800,000
- 13 Eastside Sports Complex and Senior Center** \$6,000,000
For the acquisition of approximately 50 acres along the Broadway or 22nd Street corridor east of Camino Seco and the initial development of a community sports field complex. This project will also provide the site for an eastside senior center to be funded through other sources.
 - 14 Northside Community Park** \$5,500,000
For land acquisition and initial development of a community park to serve northside residents.

- 15 Southeast Community Park** \$6,000,000
For the land acquisition and development of a community park, anticipated to be located in the vicinity of Esmond Station and adjacent to a new Vail School District high school, providing the opportunity to partner with the Vail School District to develop joint use facilities for the public and the new high school.
 - 16 Houghton Greenway** \$1,400,000
For the acquisition and development of additional segments of the Houghton Greenway located along the east side of Houghton Road from Tanque Verde Road to Interstate 10.
 - 17 Julian Wash Linear Park** \$3,700,000
For the acquisition and development of segments of Julian Wash Linear Park to provide a pathway system with connectivity to parks, schools, open spaces and neighborhoods, along the Julian Wash from Campbell Avenue to Houghton Road.
 - 18 Arroyo Chico** \$1,000,000
For the development of improvements to address riparian and recreational features along the Arroyo Chico urban watercourse, located along the Arroyo Chico Wash from Country Club Road to Campbell Avenue.
 - 19 Atturbury Wash Sanctuary Land Acquisition/Expansion** .. \$2,000,000
For the acquisition of land to preserve and protect an important riparian area and existing wildlife corridor along the Atturbury Wash, north of Lincoln Park. The project expands an existing sanctuary and will provide passive recreation amenities.
 - 20 Pantano Linear Park, 22nd St. to Michael Perry Park** \$2,700,000
For the construction of a major segment of the Pantano River Park on the east bank of the Pantano Wash, providing trail development and incorporating a commemorative tree-planting area in partnership with Trees for Tucson.
 - 21 Rio Vista Park** \$1,500,000
For the completion of the development of an existing natural resource park and restoration and revegetation of disturbed areas on the site, located at the end of Tucson Blvd. along the Rillito River.
- Town of Marana Parks** \$2,200,000
- 22 Regional Heritage and Cultural Park** \$1,000,000
For the planning, design, construction, and restoration of over 120 acres of open space to include a farmers market, an amphitheatre, museums, a community garden, a working farm, public buildings for civic groups, and 100 acres of open space, located central to the Town of Marana.
 - 23 Tortolita Trail System** \$1,200,000
For the planning, design, construction, and renovation of over 30 miles of

new and existing trails associated with the Tortolita Mountain range and Town of Marana's Tortolita Preserve. Facilities include blinds for wildlife observation, scenic overlooks, interpretive signs for natural resource education, and picnic ramadas.

- Town of Sahuarita Parks** \$2,000,000
- 24 Anamax Park Multi-Use Ballfield** \$500,000
For the construction of 2 multi-use ballfields on 22 acres of newly acquired land adjacent to the existing Anamax Park in the Town of Sahuarita.
- 25 Bicycle Lane on Sahuarita Road** \$1,500,000
For the development of bicycle lanes on both the eastbound and westbound sides of Sahuarita Road, which is part of a popular cycling route in southern Pima County.
- Town of Oro Valley Parks** \$3,000,000
- 26 Naranja Town Site Park** \$3,000,000
For the acquisition of 28 additional acres to the existing 212 acres proposed for the Naranja Town Site Park, planned to include baseball, softball, soccer and football fields, tennis center, basketball courts, skateboarding and rollerblading arena, BMX track, improved and primitive trails, community center, aquatics center and performing arts center.

LIBRARIES

- 27 Marana Continental Ranch New Library** \$4,500,000
For the design and construction of a new 15,000 square foot library for the Continental Ranch area. The library will house a 100,000-volume book collection, state-of-the-art technology, computer lab, large meeting room and small study rooms, and will include a parking lot.
- 28 Oro Valley Library Expansion** \$1,100,000
For the completion of the new 25,000 square foot library opened August 2002. Features include an expanded learning center for children, a new state of the art teen zone, a multi-functional program room, new book stacks that will accommodate 30,000 more collections and expanded computer access for all ages.
- 29 Wilmot Branch Library Replacement** \$7,000,000
For the design and construction of a 35,000 square foot replacement for the existing 19,000 square foot library built in 1965. The new library will be built either on the existing site at 530 N. Wilmot or relocated. The building will house a 140,000-volume book collection, state-of-the-art technology, computer lab, large meeting room and small study rooms, and will include a parking lot or parking garage.


